







Why Do We Come to Church?

I have loved church all my life. From as far back as I can remember, church has been the home of my heart. When I was really little, I went with my grandmother to her Baptist church, where I learned Bible stories and songs and not to kick the pew in front of me. When I was elementary age and older, I went to a Presbyterian church with my mother. I learned more about the Bible, and I sang a whole different set of hymns. From the time I was in middle school, I sang in the choir. I felt at home in that church, too, but in a different way. As an adult, I found my community in church and opportunities for service, too. But it was more than a place for me to be involved. I have always entered the sanctuary expecting to hear God's word for my life somewhere in the service. I can still remember some sermons I have heard over the years, and I remember that sense of recognition that I have had so many times when a phrase in a prayer or some line in a hymn spoke deeply to me, in a way that only God could have intended. When did you begin to come to church? What parts of our church life are especially resonant for you? What do you find here? Why is it that we come to church?

One reason is **because it is just what we do on Sunday morning**. It is the way we live our lives. It is more than a habit. Rather, it is a way of being that has become part of our identity. Dave said to someone recently, "We are church people." He's right. Another reason we come to church is **to hear the word of God spoken for our lives**. I don't just mean in sermons. I mean the prayer or the song or a comment over coffee that is just what we needed to hear that day. This leads me to the most important reason that I think we all want to come together on Sunday morning: to **experience the love of God in the love of the people in this church**. This is more than the affection for one another that we could find in any civic organization or charitable project. This is the love of God, expressed through the love of the people of God. We find that in our church, and when we are apart from one another, we can start to feel unloved – even unloved by God.

In times like these, how do we maintain our sense of identity as church-going people? How can we regularly hear the word of God spoken for our lives? And how can we experience God's love through the love we share with one another, even when coming to church in the usual way is not available to us?

I have some answers to those questions, and a suggestion, and they all require us to be intentional. The deacons and I are working hard to create worship experiences that all of us can take part in, one way or another. We can build new habits of worshiping outdoors, or setting aside time on Sunday morning to watch the service online, or finding a quiet moment to read through the mailed worship materials. I hope that somewhere in there you will still hear the word of God for your life. God's grace is sufficient to overcome our limitations in this. Listen for God's word in worship (outdoors, online, or in print), and God will whisper to your heart. And then, to experience the love of God in the love of the people of this church, we must find a way to share our love lavishly with one another, even now. So, this would be a good time to develop your own greeting card ministry. Who is on your mind today? Send that person a personal note, or make a phone call. I imagine many of you (like me) started out this spring reaching out to loved ones and friends regularly, but over time those calls and cards got further and further apart as the pandemic has stretched on and on. But it is up to us to make the intentional effort to keep our congregation connected, especially when it is difficult to do that. So, reach out to one another this week, and again next week, and again the week after that, until we can all one day be together again in safety. We are the Body of Christ, whether we are together or apart, and the love of God is present whenever we reach out to one another.

Dear church members,

Thank you so much for your support as a donor to the Horton Center Annual Fund!

This is to acknowledge, with our sincere gratitude, your contribution of \$600.00, (ck#2972, dated June 25, 2020), in exchange for which you received no goods or services.

I am happy to share with you the very good news that Horton Center is alive and well and operating even as I write this – albeit a little different!

It was a difficult decision to close in-person camp on Pine Mountain this summer. However, we have been able to do the next best thing, and invent HC@Home, a virtual camp program devised by Interim Director of Outdoor Ministries Tim Hughes and Summer Director Tivvi Pare. There are four weeks of virtual camp, a hybrid of in-person gathering via Zoom and pre-recorded songs, skits, and activities led by this year's Deans and Counselors.

As a Dean for the first two weeks of camp, and I can tell you from first-hand experience that HC@Home has worked very, very well. Each week, there are camp experiences for three different age groups. We have 'experienced' HC campers, as well as many of them experiencing Horton Center for the first time. They love the virtual hikes, virtual caving, and craft activities that have been designed for them, aided by a backpack full of goodies that was mailed to them before the start of their session.

We are doing crucial work. Not only are we offering a chance for these young people and their leaders to form a caring community, but we are also maintaining Horton Center in their hearts and minds, building the base for the hoped-for return to in-person camp next year. Because our costs are reduced, we have been able to offer HC@Home for free. We have been helped by several donors to fund specific items, like staff tee shirts, mailing packets, and more. We have been touched by several families donating the money which they would have spent on tuition. That said, our need for funds to break even for this year, and build a base for next year, is significant. You will be hearing from us soon as we launch this year's Annual Fund effort.

There is a sure knowledge that the work we are doing, with your help, is some of the most important ministry that the NH Conference offers. These young disciples are growing in wisdom and in strength (inner and outer) and in favor with God and their world. We are so grateful that you are helping make this happen.


